# Lifted up

The children on my block have made kites from paper and bamboo chopsticks and glue and hope. It is one of those days that is windy and sunny and the sky is as blue as a dream but I see only their haphazard craftsmanship, as aerodynamic as a pillar of salt, and a future of scraped knees. Delighting in the magic of standing on solid ground and feeling the tugging line of the kite soaring above them, they cheerfully ignore my lack of faith as if it is only another branch in the thick canopy of trees above them.

These children fly kites with the same reckless certitude with which they set up lemonade stands even if they are their only customers, chase after pigeons they will never catch, stomp ant hills that will be rebuilt overnight, and make up songs that they will forget by morning. Each pursuit as poignant and earnest as prayer.

The children pause, breathless, and examine their kite, try to predict the wind, and I want to tell them that it is gravity, which like the too real presence of troubles, pins us all to the ground. All flight, from spaceships to bumblebees, can be charted as an equation of mass and energy. But children have no words for the principles of physics any more than they have words for the theology of faith. As I grew up, I have clutched at the Scriptures, like they are a guideline clenched in my fist, that holds me from floating off. I have believed that you, my community of faith, could be a brindle to balance and stabilize me. But faith is not a thing engineered from paper and string.



And when the kite flutters, almost free, I remember the miraculous, inexplicable rush that comes over the slope of my soul, and lifts me up.
